Connecticut's unemployment rate drops to 5.8%; December 2021 job gain at 600

WETHERSFIELD, January 24, 2022 – Connecticut payroll employment increased by 600 jobs (0.04%) in December 2021 (preliminary) to a seasonally adjusted employment level of 1,622,000. Connecticut nonfarm employment is now 51,200 (3.3%) positions higher than the December 2020 job estimate of 1,570,800. This is the twelfth consecutive monthly gain in 2021 for a 4,267 monthly average pace and a total of 51,200 jobs added over the year. Connecticut has now recovered 74.6% (218,100) of the 292,400 positions lost in the March and April 2020 COVID lockdown period. November 2021 job gains were revised lower by 2,800 to a 2,800 (0.2%) gain. The statewide industry employment numbers are estimated by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) from a current sample of businesses in the state.

"Job growth slowed at the end of 2021 but continued to add to the very strong gains from earlier in the year," said Patrick Flaherty, Director of the Office of Research at the Connecticut Department of Labor. "Unusually warm weather during the survey week may have affected some usual winter activities. Manufacturing employment has now increased for six consecutive months. The unemployment rate fell as the labor force expanded indicating new entrants into the labor force are able to find work."

Private sector employment increased by 500 jobs (0.04%) to 1,397,100 in December 2021 and is now higher by 47,400 positions (3.5%) from the December 2020 levels. The **government** *supersector* was also higher by 100 jobs (0.4%) in December to a level of 224,900. This is 3,800 (1.7%) positions higher than December 2020. The government *supersector* includes all federal, state, and local employment, including public education and Native American casino employment located on tribal reservation land.

Six of the ten major industry *supersectors* had employment gains and four declined in December.

The six Connecticut industry supersectors that produced job growth last month included:

Connecticut Labor Market Areas (LMAs): Two of the six Connecticut *LMAs*, that are seasonally adjusted by the BLS, had monthly employment gains, while four regional labor markets had job declines in December 2021 (preliminary). The *Danbury LMA* (0.4%, 73,700) added 300 jobs as did the *New Haven LMA* (0.1%, 293,800). The *Bridgeport-Stamford-Norwalk LMA* (-0.4%, 381,500) posted the largest monthly job loss of 1,500 positions. This was followed by the *Norwich-New London-Westerly LMA* (-0.6%, 117,400) losing 700 jobs. The *Hartford LMA* (-0.1%, 557,000) was next, dropping 500 positions and the *Waterbury LMA* (-0.2%, 65,500) declined by 100 positions.

Note: The six major Connecticut LMAs are estimated independently from the statewide data by the BLS and cover more than 90% of the nonfarm employment in the state. Thus, estimates will not fully sum to the statewide total.

Hours and Earnings: The December 2021 **private sector** workweek, not seasonally adjusted, averaged 34.4 hours. This is up three-tenths of an hour from the December 2020 level (0.9%, 34.1). Average hourly earnings at \$34.11, not seasonally adjusted, were lower by \$0.27 (-0.8%) from the December 2020 estimate of \$34.38. The resulting December 2021 private sector weekly wage averaged \$1,173.38, higher by \$1.02 from a year ago (0.1%). The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U, U.S. City Average, not seasonally adjusted) in December 2021 was up 7.0% from a year ago. *Current all-employee private sector hours and earnings estimates can be volatile due to fluctuating sample responses*.

Labor Force Data (residential household survey)

The December 2021 unemployment rate for Connecticut was estimated by the BLS Local Area Unemployment Statistics program (LAUS) to be **5.8%** (seasonally adjusted), down by 0.2 percentage point from the November 2021 level of 6.0%. The Connecticut jobless rate was 8.2% in December 2020. The U.S. unemployment rate in December 2021 was 3.9%, down three-tenths of a percentage point from the November 2021 rate of 4.2% and below the 6.7% from December 2020. Not seasonally adjusted, the Connecticut unemployment rate was 4.4% compared the national average of 3.7%. Not seasonally adjusted, the Connecticut unemployment rate is 3.3% below its December 2020 level – the largest December to December drop on record (records go back to 1976).

Unemployment claims for first-time filers (seasonally adjusted) in Connecticut were an average of 2,624 per week in December 2021, down 642 (-19.7%) from the November 2021 (3,266) level and lower by 1,869 claims (-41.6%) from the average weekly count of 4,493 in December 2020. This level of monthly average weekly initial claims (2,624) for the month in the state is significantly below (-619) the February 2020 (3,243) average weekly claims tally, just before the COVID lockdown.

The nonfarm employment estimate, derived from a survey of businesses, is a measure of jobs in the state; the unemployment rate and labor force estimates are based on a household survey, and measure the work status of people who live in Connecticut. Overall, as the national and state economies recover, volatility in monthly numbers can be expected. **Job and employment estimates are best understood in the context of their movement over several months rather than observed changes in a single month's value.**

Caution should be used in interpreting any single month's estimate. The data are best interpreted to identify trends and cycles over several months and quarters. 




